This term we have a <u>word search</u> link for you to look at – an activity that can be done alone or as a group.


### How to play



#### How much help is too much?

At one time or another you may wonder if you are giving your student too much help. There is no easy answer to this as each student is an individual and every learning environment is unique. Your role as a supervisor is to supervise your student as they work on their schoolwork. If your student is struggling because the work is too easy or too hard then it would be good to discuss the situation with your student's teacher.

Over time you will get to know when your student is genuinely in need of help. The general rule is that a younger student will need more of an immediate response when they get stuck. Older students should have more strategies to fall back on. Sometimes you might feel as if your student is testing you, checking to see if you will help to make things easier. This is normal.

#### Here are a few tips:

- Check to see that your student has the all the necessary learning materials in front of them and that they are visible. Is the answer in the book at the bottom of the pile? Are they on the right website?
- Encourage your student to re-read the information or question. Sometimes reading the question out loud can help.
- Where else can your student find the answer? Have they tried all of the available options?
- Take a break, try another subject for a short time then return to the problem.

If you feel your student needs more help they (or you) can contact their teacher for guidance and support to get back on track.
