# Marble painting

Students of any age can have fun with this activity. While older ones will have more control of the marbles, the younger ones will soon learn to maneouvre them to get an interesting effect. I have seen paintings like these framed and they look fantastic!

#### **Supplies:**

- paint colours of your choice
- marbles (a small ball can be used if you don't have marbles)
- tray with sides (can be lined with tin foil)
- paper (any size or colour that will fit into the tray)
- paint containers
- plastic spoons.

#### **Steps:**

- 1. Pour paint colours into small containers and place a plastic spoon in each.
- 2. Place a sheet of paper in the tray (or whatever you're using).
- 3. Place marbles in paint containers (about 3 in each colour).
- 4. Spoon out marbles and place on paper. Older students may want to use one marble at a time to control the colour.
- 5. Gently tip the tray so the marbles roll around on the paper.
- 6. Put marbles back in their paint container.
- 7. Repeat with more marbles and colours until you're satisfied with the result.













# Hello from Adele...

#### Where were you in 1975?

This year Māori Language Week took place in July. During that week it was easy to find examples of the media, the community and individuals promoting te reo Māori. For many supervisors this annual event has helped us gain more confidence in our use and understanding of te reo Māori.

It may be a surprise to many that Māori Language Week was first introduced in 1975! Where were you when **Māori Language Week** was first introduced? Some of our supervisors would not have been born... ...others may recall 1975 as the year that:

- John Walker, later to become Sir John Walker, became the first person to run a mile in less than 3 minutes 50 seconds.

- The Māori Land March from Te Hāpua in the far north to Parliament was led by Whina Cooper, later to become Dame Whina Cooper.
